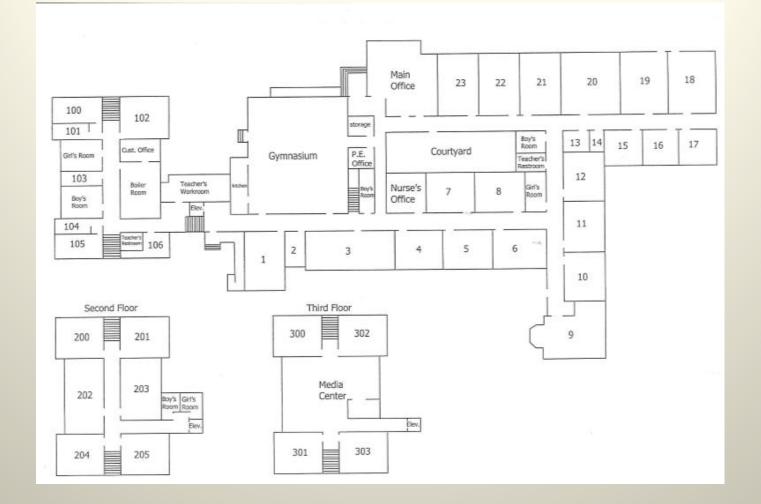

How Changes in Educational and Special Education Requirements Have Changes School Capacities



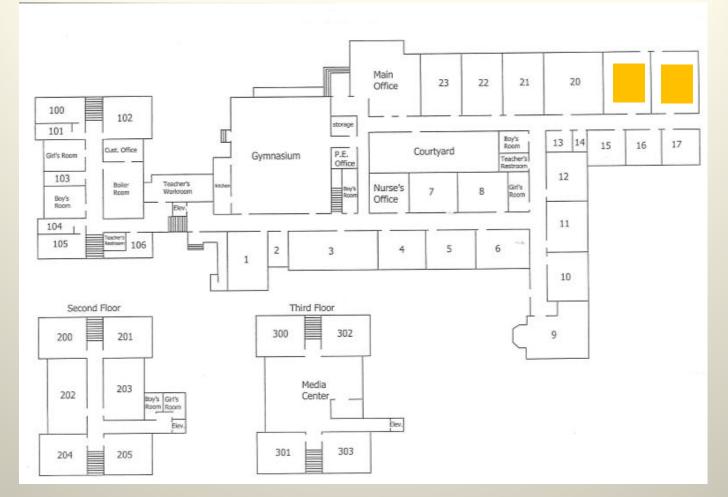

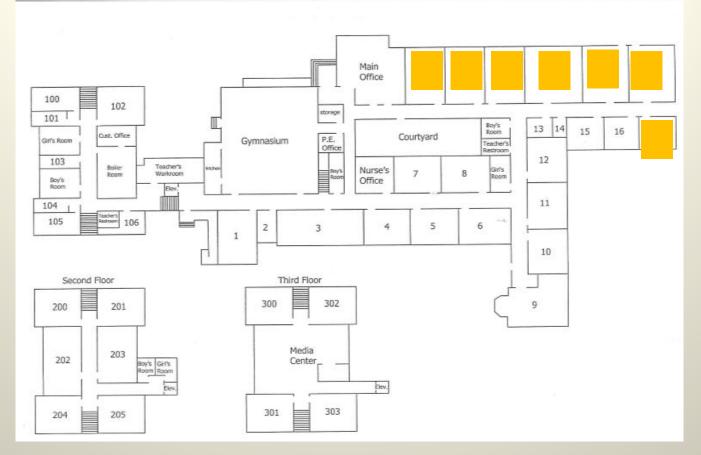

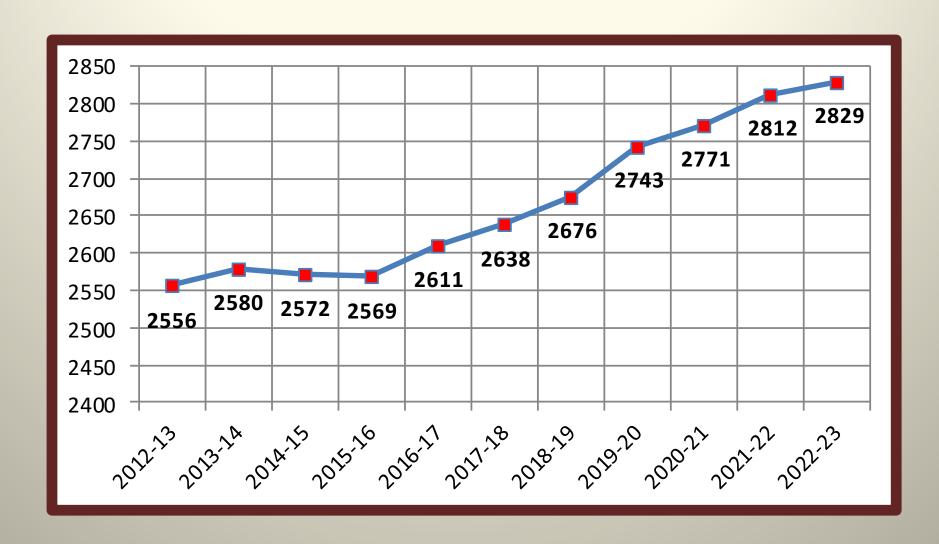

A building built for 750 in 1965 might only have a true capacity of 540 in 2018. That would still be an average of 27 students per class which by today's standards is very high.

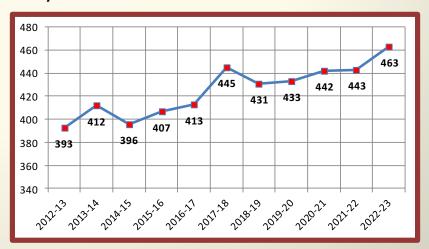


This table shows Gantner room utilization from 2018-19 through 2022-23. Gantner has a total of 17 general education classrooms which are full sized rooms. This includes the art room which is now used as a general education classroom. This study used a maximum of 30 students per class for grades 1 - 5 and a maximum of 25 students per grade for kindergarten. The table provides a projection of the need for full sized classrooms in the school. This includes general education students and students with special needs. During the 2017-18 school year and for the 2018-19 school year the building is fully utilized. The projection indicates that in 2019-20 there may be a shortfall of one classroom and between 2020-21 and 2022-23 there may be a shortfall of two classrooms.

The computer lab is located in the library/media center. There are several smaller rooms available that are used for resource and speech. The music program is conducted on the auditorium stage.

This table is the Gilbert Utilization table for the years 2017-18 (current year) to 2022-23. For grades 1 - 5 a maximum of 30 students per section was used. For kindergarten the maximum was 25. The building has 20 full sized general education classrooms of which 18 are used for general education and special education classes, one is an art room and one is a faculty room. For the years 2018-19 through 2021-22 all 18 classrooms are needed. For the 2022-23 school year it appears that there will be a shortfall of one room. This could be accommodated by either converting the art room to a general education classroom or relocating, if possible, the faculty room.

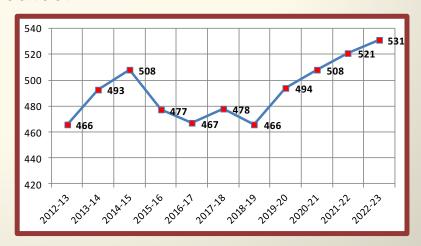
Resource rooms (2) and self-contained special education (1) are in smaller classrooms (under 600 square feet). Speech, OT and PT share a small classroom. Small group instruction (2 sections) is also located in smaller classrooms. ESL/Bi-Lingual is also located in a small room. The computer lab is located in the media center. Music programs (band/instrumental music) are located on the stage in the all-purpose room.

This building is fully utilized. It appears that every space is used. There are some program limitations because some of the rooms can only accommodate a very limited number of students. These rooms are generally dedicated to small group instruction. Space, while at a premium, appears to be used efficiently and the school does meet the needs of the students. The school is projected to grow moderately during the next five years. The total projection including pre-K is for an increase of 20 students overall, but the K-5 enrollment is projected to increase by 24. This will require at least one additional section in 2022-23 and this may also have an impact on class sizes.

It is important to note that in 2021-22 and 2022-23 there may be a need to convert the art room into a general education classroom as the projection indicates a need for 19 general education sections in those years.

This table shows the utilization for Sixteenth Avenue School. There are 24 full sized classrooms in Sixteenth Ave School. All 24 are used for General Education, special education and pre-Kindergarten. It appears that in terms of classroom space the building is at its maximum. For this study a 25 student maximum was applied to kindergarten. There are three sections of self-contained classes held in smaller rooms. Speech, OT and PT are in smaller rooms. The computer lab is in the media center. There are three large rooms used as resource rooms. Music is conducted in homerooms and band is on the stage of the all-purpose room. The enrollment in the K-5 general education population is projected to grow from the current 426 students to 457 in 2022-23. That is a K-5 increase of 31 students. This will have the potential of creating larger class sizes in this school or driving the need for another section.

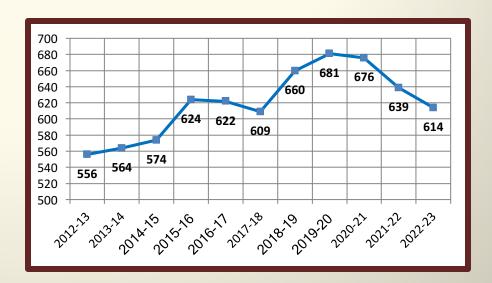
Class sizes appear to be primarily in the mid 20's with some as high as 28. It may be difficult to accommodate the future growth anticipated for this school.

#### **Critical Classroom Count Analysis**

The nature of secondary schools, particularly a high school, is complicated in terms of creating a facility analysis. The nature of a high school schedule, the large variety of courses (required and elective) and the existence of singleton and doubleton (courses offered in only one or two section a semester), does create challenges in both student schedules and room assignments. In order to assess the efficiency of utilization of classroom space in a high school we use a concept called critical classroom count analysis. The rationale for the use of this concept is that there are a certain number of required courses and academic electives that are, at a minimum, what the school must provide to its students. It is also critical that the school provides classroom space to meet the needs of students with special needs.

The critical classroom count analysis defines the minimum number of classrooms required to meet the academic needs of general education students. Once done that allows for the count of those full sized classroom which may be needed to provide other required and/or mandated services to the students. Table 12 lists all of the full sized room available at the high school and then blocked out the number of periods each room was used. Included in this table were general education, health and special education rooms used. The percentage for each of the general education used per day was calculated and averaged (health and special education classes were not included in this calculation). Specialized rooms such as art, music and computer rooms were also not included in this calculation. The average utilization for academic classroom utilization for 2017-18 is 62%. Based upon the enrollment and the building capacity this shows that the high school is utilized well. This is also evident in reviewing average class sizes. While some academic classes do have as many as 30 students the majority of class sizes, on average, appear to be in the low 20's.

In a discussion with the high school principal it was stated that space was not a problem in the high school, and, if more resources were made available (i.e.-teaching staff) given the amount of available rooms space, that it might be possible to expand academic course offerings for students in key academic areas.

The issue that must also be considered in future plans for the high school is that during the next five years (through 200-23) the high school is projected to grow from the current 741 to 902. That is a projected increase of 21.7%. This could have an impact on both room utilization and staffing needs.

#### Conclusion

During the course of this study we had the opportunity to visit each of the schools. We were impressed with the maintenance of each of the buildings both in terms of cleanliness and atmosphere. It is apparent that the teachers and the administrators take pride in the appearance of their buildings. We were also impressed with the manner in which the principals find space in each of their buildings to accommodate the needs of their students.

The major concern that we have is that the District enrollment is growing, especially at the elementary and high school levels. For the elementary schools it appears that they are using every available space. Further, in many cases class sizes are in excess of 25 students per class and with limited space available it appears that this number could get higher. None of the elementary schools are losing enrollment. It appears that even moving some students from one school to another to lower class sizes will have limited benefits.

As far as the high school is concerned at this time classroom space is not an issue, but it is possible that this will change as the high school enrollment increases during the next five years. The middle school appears to have room and with some scheduling adjustments, possible repurposing of some rooms along with additional staff, the school should be able to meet the needs of students based upon the projectio
